WILMER HAYDEN WELSH PRIZE IN COMPOSITION – Annabel Semans '26

Established in 2006 in honor of Wilmer Hayden Welsh, Composer and Professor of Music at Davidson College from 1963-1991, The Welsh Prize in Composition recognizes the best original music composition created by a Davidson student in the previous calendar year. The Music Department is pleased to award the 2025 Welsh Prize to **Annabel Semans.** Her composition, *Wander*, demonstrates fluid, contrasting layers of calm and playful rhythms, surprising suspensions, and a sense of mindful freedom and release through its cyclical expression.

### STEINWAY AWARD - Henry Chesley-Vogels '25

The Steinway Award recognizes outstanding performance, musicianship, and artistic and academic scholarship. This year's recipient has been a dedicated, core member of the Davidson College Chorale throughout his Davidson tenure.
