Title: Quilting COVID: Documenting a Pandemic with Thread

For hundreds of years, quilts have functioned as storytellers and documenters of history. Dasha Chapman, Visiting Assistant Professor of Dance

Title: Finding the Body, Remaking the World: A Series on Movement In and Against Confinement

How can we feel into moments of crisis and draw inspiration from dance and Africana embodied technologies long-practiced in contexts of duress? In this 4-workshop series, Dr. Dasha Chapman brings 3 different dance scholar-practitioners together to lead movement-discussion workshops that guide participants in exploring, reconfiguring, and reflecting on the possibilities of finding the body in [literal and metaphorical] spaces of confinement. Drawing improvisational practices and creativities from experimental arts practice and Africana frameworks, these workshops will engage movement, writing, dialogue and co-creation to foster new relationships to self, other, space-time, creativity, and survival. Ultimately culminating in collaborative performances, our work together will create community and investigate remaking the world.
